Yarning Conference

On the 25th of October 2022, all the year 5's went to a Yarning conference, a conference where people gather around to hear and learn about Aboriginal stories of the past. Mandy Nicholson, a Wurundjeri woman, spoke about pride, culture and language. She told us that having culture is so important. That language was so important, she said without it our identity would be lost. We learnt about truth telling with Uncle Stu and Uncle Charles. Uncle Stu explained how he was a part of the Stolen Generation. He was taken from his mother at a fairly young age. Can you imagine being stolen from your parents and placed in another family who you didn't know? Your culture and language suddenly disappear. You start to wonder, who am I?

Mandy Nicholson taught us about a smoking ceremony. She used eucalyptus leaves and explained how their natural oil helps us when we have a cold or flu. She poured water over the eucalyptus and placed them on the fire releasing a lot of smoke. Micheal Long walked from Melbourne to Canberra, to help fight and gain support for Aboriginals and Torres Strait Islanders. We did something similar, we did a Little Long walk to commemorate what Micheal Long did for Aboriginals and Torres Strait Islanders. We need to get up, stand up, and show up!

On the 25th of October, the year 5's went to Bundoora Farm for the 2022 Yarning Conference. We learnt and experienced many new things, such as Aboriginal words and their English meaning. We also saw a burt (smoke) ceremony.

A burt ceremony is where people start a small fire and then put wet eucalyptus leaves on the fire. That creates lots of burt. Indigenous people say that they used eucalyptus leaves as medicine when they have a cold or the flu.

Our year 5's also heard the Truth Telling from two Indigenous men; Uncle Stu and Uncle Charles. The Truth Telling was told in a small rectangular room that is soon to be called the Truth Telling room where people can go and learn about Truth Telling.

Truth Telling is where Indigenous elders talk about their life when they were living with a white family and their life during the Stolen Generation.

The year 5's, along with another 430 kids were taught many new Aboriginal words from the wonderful Mandy Nicholson. As Mandy was talking to us we saw many Gurrng-Gurrng (Kookaburras).

When the day came to an end the year fives from Reservoir East primary school performed a song called Get up! Stand up! Show up! based on this year's NAIDOC theme. They sang this song with an Indigenous musician and song-writer, Uncle James Williams.

On the 25th of October, the grade fives went to the Yarning conference in Bundoora Park, Darebin. Other schools attended with their grade fives too, all the schools participated in workshops including arts and talks about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders.

The smoking ceremony was really significant to me because of the way Aboriginals and Torres Strait Islanders use eucalyptus leaves on a patch of fire and water to create the smoke. Eucalyptus is a type of medicine to soothe a cold or the flu.

This years NAIDOC theme is "GET UP! STAND UP! SHOW UP!". A woman called Mandy Nicholson taught us some words in Aboriginal and gave a speech about her love for this country. My favourite word is **Gurrng-Gurrng** (Kookaburra).

A man called Uncle Stewart talked about Bundoora park back in the 1900's and how Europeans use to mine somewhere in Bundoora park. Uncle Stewart also told us that he was a part of the Stolen Generation and so was his mother. When Uncle Stewart was thirty years old he found his actual birth mother and met his siblings as well.

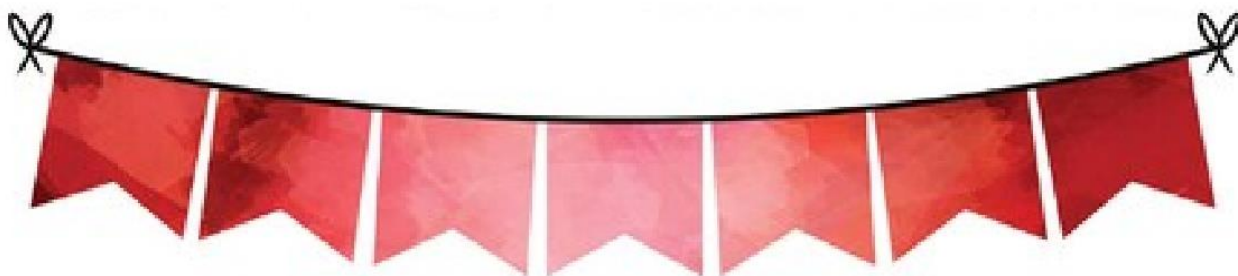

November – Remembering the Dead

Remembering the Dead has always been a part of the Catholic Tradition. And this remembering was usually associated with the celebration of the Mass. Mass was celebrated on the anniversary of each person's death. This practice was especially significant when it involved the death of martyrs; the celebration of their deaths was the beginning of the celebration of feast days of the saints.

The passage from this life to the life of the future, that is the life of the resurrection, was conceived on the model of the death of Jesus. His death was seen as a Passover through death into the new life of the resurrection. So, the death of the followers of Jesus was conceived as their sharing in his movement from this life to the Father.

As time and reflection went along, people became aware that there was still a need for some sort of purification for those who died. One of the ways of conceiving it was that they were being refined as metals were refined. The imagery of purifying fire entered the scene in such imagery; it also echoed some biblical imagery. Note that it was imagery! However, as one of the great historians writing about Purgatory says in the early Middle Ages, there was a riot of the imagination, and this purifying began to be conceived as a place of purification: what many of us would have heard about as Purgatory. (Even though in the old Catechism it was defined as 'a place or state of punishment' for those yet to be purified.)

Before such a conception arose, the basic imagery was that of a journey, which fits in better with the basic Christian idea of a passing over into the hands of God, which we saw above was the most basic way of imaging our 'going to God'. It echoes the words of Jesus on the cross: "Into your hands, I commit my spirit". So, the community of the Church prayed for the dead person who was completing their journey to God. They accompanied them on their journey in prayer and procession and in the celebration of the Eucharist.

Over the next couple of weeks, we will tease out some of the themes touched above.

First Reading Wis 11:22-12:2

You have mercy on all things because you love everything that exists.

In your sight, Lord, the whole world is like a grain of dust that tips the scales, like a drop of morning dew falling on the ground.

Yet you are merciful to all, because you can do all things and overlook men's sins so that they can repent.

Yes, you love all that exists, you hold nothing of what you have made in abhorrence, for had you hated anything, you would not have formed it.

And how, had you not willed it, could a thing persist, how be conserved if not called forth by you?

Jesus entered Jericho and was going through the town when a man whose name was Zacchaeus made his appearance; he was one of the senior tax collectors and a wealthy man. He was anxious to see what kind of man Jesus was, but he was too short and could not see him for the crowd; so he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to catch a glimpse of Jesus who was to pass that way. When Jesus reached the spot he looked up and spoke to him: 'Zacchaeus, come down. Hurry, because I must stay at your house today.' And he hurried down and welcomed him joyfully. They all complained when they saw what was happening. 'He has gone to stay at a sinner's house' they said. But Zacchaeus stood his ground and said to the Lord, 'Look, sir, I am going to give half my property to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody I will pay him back four times the amount.' And Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house, because this man too is a son of Abraham; for the Son of Man has come to seek out and save what was lost.'

Zacchaeus was an over-the-top character, not only figuratively but, in this incident, quite literally up in a sycamore tree. He thought he was keeping an eye out for Jesus, but Jesus was keeping an eye out for his sort of character!

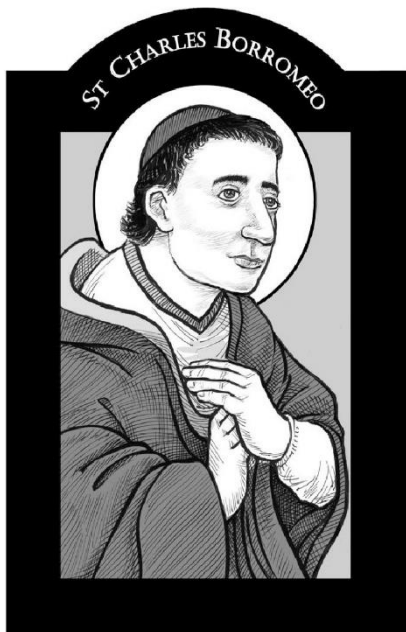
'Zacchaeus' means 'clean'. But his fellow Jews regarded him as a filthy collaborator with the Romans. However, Jesus looked up and saw Zacchaeus in a double perspective, not only as he was but as he could become if only he responded to the grace on offer. He did, and the response was truly 'over the top'!

We come to Mass to catch a glimpse of Jesus in the scriptures and sacrament. But, we find that our Risen Lord is constantly gazing at us. He is the Divine Seer who sees us as we are, but also as we are capable of becoming.

We could pause for a moment to pray to become more conscious of the gaze of the Divine Seer. There could be 'over-the-top' consequences!

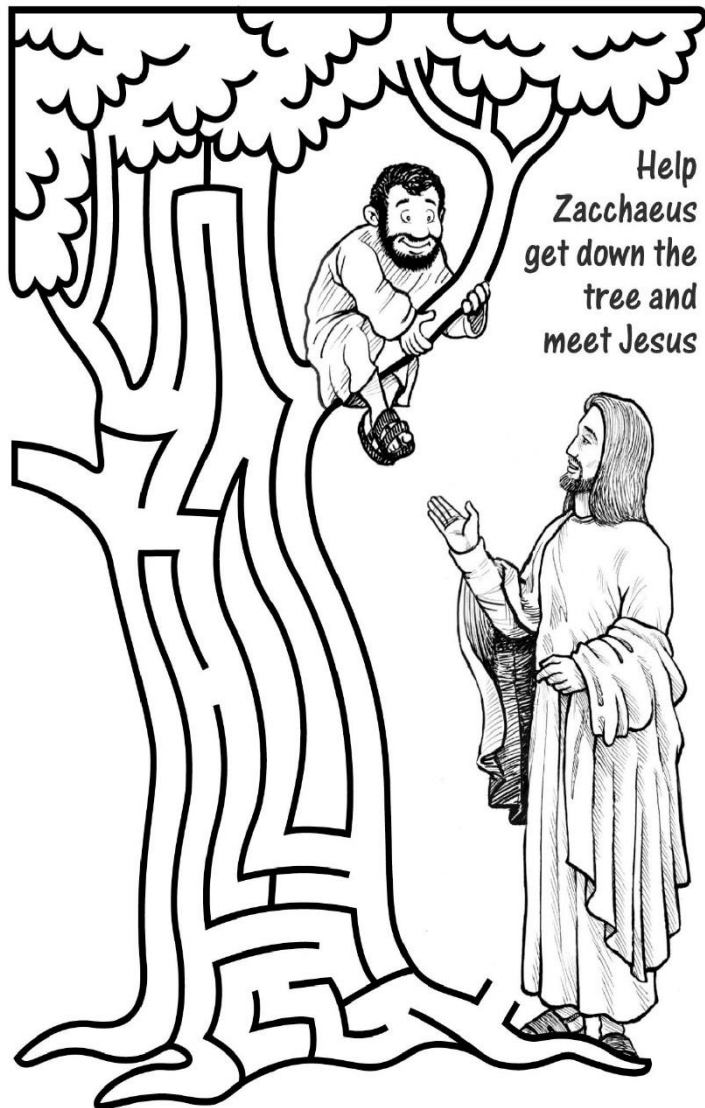

St Charles Borromeo was born of a wealthy Italian family and was the nephew of Pope Pius IV. At the age of twenty two, he was summoned to Rome and made cardinal and administrator of the Papal states and the archdiocese of Milan. Despite his personal wealth, St Charles lived a simple, ascetic life and was a strong supporter of church reform. In 1564 he was ordained a priest and consecrated as bishop. He founded seminaries and instituted the teaching of doctrine to children in Sunday schools. Never one to ask of another something he was not prepared to do himself, St Charles worked tirelessly to help those in need.

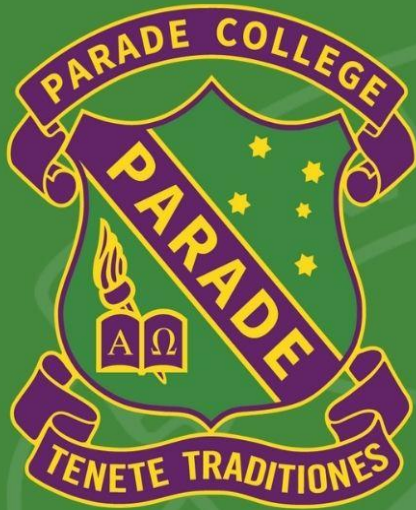
