# Dear Parents,

It's truly impressive to see the achievements of Year 5 students at Our Lady of the Way in the NAPLAN assessments. The fact that the students exceeded expectations and ranked highly in various subjects speaks to the effectiveness of the educational strategies implemented at the school.

We have had further confirmation that our Year 5 students performed extremely high in Naplan 2023. OLW is classified as a school in the Eastern Region. In the East, our year 5 students enabled OLW to be ranked 4<sup>th</sup> in reading, 9<sup>th</sup> in writing and 2<sup>nd</sup> in numeracy.

Out of all of the 300 catholic primary schools in Melbourne our Year 5 students ranked 5<sup>th</sup> in reading, 18<sup>th</sup> in writing and 2<sup>nd</sup> in numeracy.

The emphasis on the Science of Learning for reading, writing, spelling, and math seems to have played a pivotal role in these positive outcomes. This approach involves incorporating evidence-based teaching methods and strategies that are grounded in cognitive and educational research. By tailoring instruction to how students learn best and focusing on the underlying processes of learning, schools can often see improved academic performance. Our Daily Reviews in reading, writing, vocabulary, spelling, decoding, fluency, comprehension and maths has had a major impact on our students being able to transfer knowledge to their long-term memory and to retrieve information quickly when needed.

# **FAMILY SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT SURVEY**



Our school is participating in Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools – School Improvement Surveys (MACSSIS). MACSSIS is an annual process whereby schools listen to the thoughts and feelings of students, families and staff have about how their school can improve. These surveys help inform the ongoing improvement of schools across the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

One of the main goals of the family survey is to identify the strengths and areas for improvement in our school. MACSSIS data benefits everyone within our school and provides valuable community insights on areas that each school can focus on. Our school believes it is important to encourage families to have a voice and contribute to shaping the ongoing improvement of the school. This survey touches on a wide range of topics, each unique to the student, family, and staff datasets. Through these domains, analysis teams can delve into perspectives across surveys, drawing comparisons with other school-related datasets. The family survey focuses on the following areas:

- Hurdles to engagement
- Alignment with the school environment
- Atmosphere within the school
- Safety of students
- Communication
- Catholic identity

Over the next week, a random selection of families will receive information via email on how to access and complete the survey. It takes 20 minutes and gives us valuable information following our School Review. Our staff and Year 4-6 students will also take part in the survey.

Last Friday, Mr Brad Hall, our Student Wellbeing Leader, began the National Day of Action (NDA) Against Bullying with a whole school assembly. He spoke to our students about the importance of students growing positive connections with other students and the broader school community and how this can enhance the students' cognitive, behavioural and emotional engagement. Mr Hall highlighted the importance of connections in preventing bullying, and helped students identify the connections they have in their lives.





The NDA is Australia's key bullying prevention initiative for schools, encouraging whole-school communities to work together to implement evidence-informed positive and proactive solutions to prevent and address bullying.

The NDA theme for 2023 is 'growing connections'. This theme supports research findings that strong school community connections and social skills are protective factors in the prevention of bullying and help enable positive, help-seeking behaviours in students.

# Day 1

Learning about hygiene & mircobes Growing microbes in Agar plates

Last Tuesday, Sarika and Aaron spoke to the Year 1 and 2 classes about Hygiene. They explained good and bad bacteria and how bacteria can cause viruses, and the different microorganisms. Sarika organised a test to see how much microbes (bacteria, fungi, virus, algae and protozoa) are on our hands using petri dishes (agar plates).















# Day 2 Seeing what microbes we have grown

Sarika returned on Friday with the results. The results were very interesting and we thank Sarika and Aaron for their insights, testing, time and tremendous effort involved in organising this. Interestingly, the students who play regularly on the oval had the most microbes on their hands, even though the test was conducted at 10.00am. This illustrates the importance of regular washing of our hands with soap.




Clean agar plate. This is the cleanest because the hand that tuched it was sanitised.






Agar plate showing mold and bacteria.

Student reflections



On Tuesday Sarika, Aaron's mum, came and talked about hygiene. First, if you have some bread that has mold on it, don't just scrape it off and eat it because there can be lots of germs and bacteria that you can't see. You have to throw it out. If your strawberry jam has a small blob of mold, at least scoop out about 10cms off the top of the jar. If you have a plastic bag of grated cheese, don't use your hands to scoop out the cheese because your hands can have germs and bacteria that you can't see and you will get it on the cheese. We did an experiment to see how clean our hands are and how much bacteria and germs we have. Children who washed their hands and kept their hands clean had the least germs. The boys who played soccer on the oval had the dirtiest hands because they didn't wash their hands after they played soccer. It was a fun experiment.

We had another experiment using pepper and water. We put water and pepper in a bowl. The pepper stuck to our fingers. Then we put soap on our fingers and we put our fingers in the pepper and water again. The pepper didn't stick to our finger. It was a fun experiment.

On Monday Aaron's Mum Sarika, the scientist, came in and taught us about nasty germs and viruses.The petri dishes we touched showed no germs then when she came back on Friday they showed lots of germs.Ours hardly had any germs but the people who played soccer on the oval had so much! Finally, we talked about what we now know about hygiene - that we need to wash our hands before we eat and ESPECIALLY after going to the toilet!!! If we do this we can stay healthy and not spread bacteria, viruses

Students immersed themselves in a few science experiments this week. We examined our sense of touch and taste, kinetic energy, surface tension and chemical reactions, we devised hypotheses and most importantly, aimed to understand the everyday scientific phenomenon that occurs around us.













# **MAKING RAINBOWS WITH A PRISM**

When light enters a prism it is refracted (bent). Each colour of the spectrum is refracted by a different amount and the colours are dispersed, or spread out, allowing you to see them. A prism is a great way to demonstrate visually that white light is actually made up of 7 different colours.













# Travelling Water Experiment

The water moves up the paper towels through a process called capillary action. The paper towel is made from fibers and the water is able to travel through the gaps in the fibers. The gaps in the paper towel act like capillary tubes and pull the water upward. This is what helps water climb from a plant's roots to the leaves at the top of the plant or tree.

The water is able to move upward against gravity because of the attractive forces between the water and the fibers in the

paper towel.




















# YR 5/6 GUEST SPEAKER - KATRINA MORROW

Mary's secret is humility. It is her humility that attracted God's gaze to her. The human eye always looks for grandeur and allows itself to be dazzled by what is flashy. Instead, God does not look at the appearance. God looks at the heart. Today, looking at Mary assumed into heaven, we can say that humility is the way that leads to Heaven. The word "humility" comes from the Latin word humus, which means "earth". It is paradoxical: to arrive on high, into Heaven, what is needed is to stay low, like the earth- God lifts up those who humble themselves. He lifts up those who serve. Mary says nothing else about herself and she seeks nothing else for herself.

Today, then, let us ask ourselves, each one of us in our heart: How am I doing with humility? Do I seek to be recognized by others, to affirm myself and to be praised, or do I think rather about serving? Do I know how to listen, like Mary, or do I want only to speak and receive attention? Do I know how to keep silence, like Mary, or am I always chattering? Do I know how to take a step back, defuse quarrels and arguments, or do I always want to stand out?

In her littleness, Mary wins Heaven first. The secret of her success is precisely that she recognizes her lowliness, that she recognizes her need. Only those who empty themselves can be filled by God. And Mary is the "full of grace". Those who are filled with themselves have no space for God — and we can be full of ourselves — but those who remain humble, allow the Lord to accomplish great things through them.

Mary is assumed into heaven: small and humble; And there she awaits us as a mother waits for her children to come home. We are on a journey, pilgrims towards the home that is up there. It is a huge message of hope for each of us. The feast of the Assumption of Mary is a call to each of us, especially those who are afflicted by doubt and sadness, and live with their gaze turned down. Let us look up because Heaven is open. It is no longer distant because on the threshold of Heaven our mother is awaiting us. She loves us, she smiles at us and she thoughtfully assists us. And she says to us, "You are precious in God's eyes".

Each time that we hold the Rosary in our hands and pray to her, we are taking a step forward, towards the great destination of life. And so, let us pray to her now that she may accompany us on our journey that leads from Earth to Heaven. May she remind us that the secret to the journey is contained in the word humility and in our service.

## First Reading is 56:1.6-7

My daughter is tormented by a devil.' But he answered her not a word. And his disciples went and pleaded with him. 'Give her what she wants,' they said 'because she is shouting after us.' He said in reply, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the House of Israel.' But the woman had come up and was kneeling at his feet. 'Lord,' she said 'help me.' He replied, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the house-dogs.' She retorted, 'Ah yes, sir; but even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table.' Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.





# Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

A pagan woman approaches a Jewish man and she begs Jesus to heal her daughter.

Jesus gives a dismissive answer to the woman: 'It is not fair to take the children's bread and throw it to the house dogs.' The children are obviously the Jewish people.


This remarkable pagan woman stands her ground and engages in a verbal joust with Jesus! She argues: 'Yes, Lord, but even the house dogs get the crumbs that fall from their master's table.'

Jesus recognises *her* faith and the daughter was healed. This story was put in the Gospels to show how Jesus extended his saving mission to non-Jews in Pagan territory.

That is Good News for billions of non-Jewish people over the course of history since then and into the future. That is why we are truly 'Catholic', which, as you know, is the Greek for 'world-wide'.


We could pause for a moment to celebrate this Canaanite woman as the first 'Catholic'!

uiseppe Sarto was born into a poor family in 1835. From this humble begining he was eventually elected pope in 1903. He took as his motto, "To restore all things in Christ". Pius X was remembered for many things including advocating the frequent reception of holy communion and the admission to it of children from the age of about seven; reform of church music and encouraging the use of Gregorian chant; the reform of Canon Law; the reorganization of the Roman curia; and the separation of church and state in France. He also promoted Bible reading for all Catholics and encouraged the use of clear and simple homilies. He found some aspects of the Vatican's wealth and ceremony distasteful. Before his death in 1914, Pius X wrote in his will, "I was born poor, I have lived poor, and I wish to die poor."
