REFLECTION: PART 6 'WHO DO WE THINK WE ARE?

In appreciating who we are as 'the Church' – as followers of Jesus Christ – we need to consider our very long history. 'We' are not just the 'We' of today but we belong to a 'We' that goes back a very long way.

Our identity has its roots in Jesus Christ who lived some 2,000 years ago — and nothing can take his place. So, the stretch from his time to ours goes into the making of who we are. Those believers who first bore witness to him, and who put that witness down on paper thus giving us the gospels and the rest of the New Testament, remain crucial to our faith and our identity as Christians. We cannot make up what we believe. What we believe now has to be in continuity with the faith of those first believers, even though there are considerable differences between their time and ours and between them and us. This is what the Creed means when it calls the Church 'apostolic' — it has its roots in the apostles and those first apostolic times. And we must maintain and nourish the continuity between those times and our own. In between those first times and our present, there have been many centuries and many

In between those first times and our present, there have been many centuries and many changes: a great variety of cultures and languages and ways of thinking, new geographical locations, differing political systems, differing relationships between the Church civil authorities. In all these different situations, there have been developments in the understanding of the Gospel and in the way the Church has lived and presented itself and taken its place in these many societies. But all this has happened while maintaining our roots in the New Testament and with an eye always cast in its direction.

Bishop Mackinlay named to synod's Final Document Commission

Bishop Shane Mackinlay of Sandhurst has been elected to the Final Document Commission of the Synod of Bishops, representing Oceania in a group of 14 members responsible for overseeing the drafting of the synod's concluding document. His appointment is part of an approach that ensures broad geographical representation in the commission. The final document is expected to offer proposals on topics such as the role of women in the Church, participation in decision-making, and the decentralisation of authority.



Gospel Mk 10:35-45 (or shorter form Mk 10:42-45)

The Son of Man came to give his life as a ransom for all.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him, 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'

When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them: 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'


Today's gospel tells us that James and John wanted to sit at the right and left side of Jesus in his kingdom. They were thinking of power and authority; that they are worthy of higher places. They asked Jesus to do something unheard of. This happened even though they had been followers and friends of Jesus for a while and had heard what he had to say frequently: that he had not come to be served but to serve. How different is the Lord's attitude from those who always want to be served, to be admired, and even to be feared!

We also see in the gospel reading how the other ten apostles were offended by what James and John said. And Jesus, trying to minimise the problem and reconcile them, gathered them together and explained that those who consider themselves to be rulers, whoever wants to be first, must be the servant of all. He reminds them once again that the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve and to give his life for all.

We observe too many times that our human temptation is driven towards power and authority. We can even see this in our own Christian communities. There are divisions; groups are formed whose aim is ambition and a desire for power. The power causes more division rather than unity.

The power that is not controlling, but the opposite, is the power of appeal. The power of appeal comes for example from a person suffering from illness, from a poor or outcast member of society. This power of appeal inspires our spirit, moves our hearts so that we can help and support others without hesitation. Only the Good Samaritan recognises the power of appeal from the beaten person, then actually stopped and helped the person in their distress while others tried to avoid and moved away. It is the power of appeal which the gospel invites us to discover and to achieve.

Today, let us pause and redirect ourselves again towards the power that helps us to become closer to others; the power that brings peace, unity rather than division, the power that shares love and is inclusive.



ope Saint John Paul II was born Karol Józef Wojtyła in 1920 in the Polish town of Wadowice. Growing up, he was keen on swimming and skiing, and at university he developed an interest in theatre and poetry. After his father's death in 1941, he decided to join the priesthood and studied at the seminary while Poland was under occupation by the Nazis. He was ordained a priest in 1946 and was appointed the Auxilary Bishop of Kraków in 1958, and later took part in Vatican II. Following the sudden death of Pope John Paul I, he was elected Pope in 1978, becoming the first non-Italian pope since 1523. He was the second longest serving pope in modern history and travelled the world extensively, visiting 129 countries during his pontificate. John Paul II is widely credited with helping to bring down Communism in Europe and he made many efforts to improve relations beween the church and other faiths including Islam and Judaism.
