Dear Parents & Families,

On Friday, we were very pleased to have announced that Mrs. Grace Lucic will be taking over as Principal from the commencement of the 2025 school year. Grace is currently Deputy Principal at St Francis of Assisi in Mill Park, and is part of our Learning Collective who have worked closely together over the past four years to implement and build the Science of Learning Instructional Model. Her appointment will ensure a very smooth transition in leadership and learning, and allow OLW to continue to build on our outstanding work.

STRUCTURES 2025

We currently finalizing our classes for 2025, so it is timely to remind parents that the staff are very aware of the needs of all students, and that all classes are constructed to develop the optimum learning environment for all students at their level, taking into account gender balance and academic, behavioural, social/emotional and special learning needs. Therefore, we do not take requests for particular teachers from parents as this goes against our belief of the value and importance of each individual child and can unfairly imbalance the process.

Our changes in staffing for 2025, excluding my retirement, is the return of Hannah Walsh who will run our Futurescapes Program, and the welcoming of Clare Bisby who will be teaching Year 3/4 with Rebekah Zammit. Huong Lamont plans to return from Parental Leave in the second half of the year, and will continue in her Deputy Principal role. Melanie Thomson will remain in the Acting Deputy role for the entire 2025 school year.

PSG MEETINGS

PSG Meetings for students on PLP's are being held over two Wednesday's, a Friday and a Tuesday afternoon.

Students that have additional learning needs have a PLP (Personal Learning Plan) which is developed and co-constructed with parents and teachers over time. Each term, parents of students who have a PLP are required to have a PSG (Program Support Meeting) with their child's teacher to discuss goals and achievements of the student and to plan learning goals for the next term.

It is a requirement of our NCCD (National Consistent Collection of Data) that students on PLPs have a PSG each term, that minutes are taken of the meeting and that the PLP and minutes are signed by all present at the PSG.

As outlined in our Learning Diversity Policy, these meetings are required to be during school times so that key people and external professionals working with the child can be present. 2025 FAMILY & LEVY FEES

The School Fee for 2025 will be \$1950 per family and the levy will be \$400 per child. (\$50.00 will be refunded if families attend one working bee during the year). The annual rise in the fee is kept to a minimum and in line with, or just below CPI, to ensure that OLW remains accessible for all families.

Our fees are also influenced by the Commonwealth Department of Education's calculation of our community's ability to financially contribute to the operating costs of our school, known as the Capacity to Contribute, or CTC, which is also reviewed annually by the government.

Please remember that if you ever have any concerns over the payment of school fees, you should contact the office so that we can assist you with managing your situation.

Student Book Orders will be managed by the school again this year. Families will not be required to order any classroom books or

equipment for 2025. All books and requirements for your child will be billed to your 2025 school fee account.

◆ **FAITH REFLECTION:** PART 10 of 'WHO DO WE THINK WE ARE?'

People with a History By Fr Frank O'Loughlin

Being a Catholic has got a history to it! Catholics have lived through very many times which were quite different from each other. There are things which have always been part of being Catholic: such central things as believing in Jesus as the centre of our lives; believing that he seeks to gather us into his Church; believing that he continues to be with us in our lives and especially in the celebration of the Eucharist. But these core realities of our faith have been lived out in very different cultures and in changing circumstances. Christianity is very adaptable. Christianity began as a very Jewish faith, following the ways in which Judaism prayed and expressed itself. There was a great controversy in New Testament times about just how Jewish Christianity had to be. Some thought it should exist within Judaism, others thought it had to break out of Judaism in order to become truly itself. St Paul was strongly of this latter opinion and became quite angry with those who were not prepared to move on, as they were with him.

There was a tension between moving on into the future and the desire to leave things as they were! This tension has repeated itself throughout much of the Church's history. It is a tension which is still at work in the Church today. We have only to read the changes that are going on in our time and the need to adapt to meet these circumstances. For instance, many of us today grew up in a Catholic culture in which, it was presumed that we would continue 'the faith of our fathers and mothers' and this was supported by the atmosphere in which we lived out our lives which tended to take belief in God for granted. That is no longer so. In the atmosphere in which we live today: belief in God is something which is not part of what is taken for granted. So, handing on the faith simply cannot be taken for granted. We have to be able to give an account of 'the hope that is in us' as St Peter says in his First Letter in the New Testament. We are in a new ball game. We need to remember that the Lord is playing in this game also; but we have to be open to the way he is playing. The Synod on Synodality taking place in Rome is about listening to the voice of the Holy Spirit as that emerges in the interplay between listening believers. To simply hold on to our way of seeing things without listening is to walk into a dead-end.

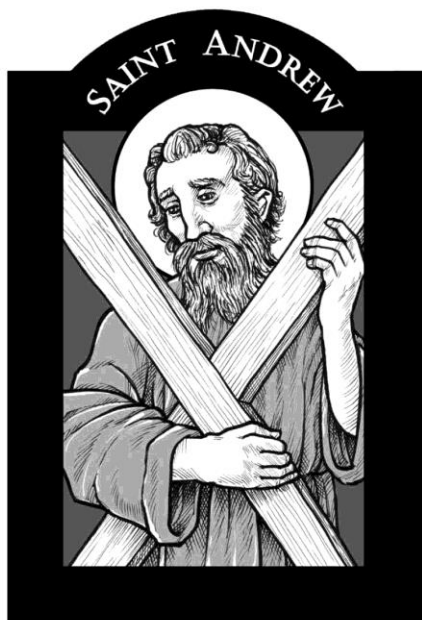
'Are you the king of the Jews?' Pilate

who say it' answered Jesus. 'Yes, I am
a king. I was born for this, I came into
the world for this: to bear witness to
the truth; and all who are on the side of
truth listen to my voice.'



Reflection by Greg Sunter

This week marks the end of the
liturgical year. Next week, with the first
week of Advent, we begin the new
liturgical cycle. It is fitting that the
Church concludes the liturgical year
with the celebration of Christ the King.
The conversation between Jesus and
Pilate displays a lot of word play on the
part of Jesus and quite a lot of
confusion on the part of Pilate. The
confusion stems from different
perceptions of what it means to be a
king. For Pilate, part of the most
powerful political and military rule in
the ancient world, the idea of a king
was a threat. Claiming kingship was
claiming authority and power that
would inevitably lead to challenging the
authority and power of Rome and, more
directly, its representative in Palestine
- Pilate. Jesus, of course, had a
completely different idea about
ushering in a kingdom. He does indeed
declare that he is a king and that is
what leads us to today's feast of Christ
the King. However, his intention is not
to claim a position of power and
authority. When we think back to Jesus'
teachings about the kingdom of God,
we recall that he declares the people of
highest status - the first - in the
kingdom to be the lowliest of this world.
It is the poor, the sick, the outcast, the
children and the widows who will hold
the highest places in the kingdom of
God. In a kingdom like that, what does
it mean to declare oneself king? The
confusion about what it means to be a
king that is captured in this interaction
between Jesus and Pilate is the same
confusion that we saw among the
disciples as they came to terms with
exactly what it means to be the
Messiah.

St Andrew came from Capernaum and was a fisherman by trade. He was a disciple of John the Baptist before he and his brother, Simon Peter, were called to be the first apostles of Christ. In the Gospels he is mentioned for his part in the feeding of the 5000, as well as John's Gospel account of the Greeks who wished to meet Jesus. There is uncertainty as to where he preached, where he died and was buried. Ancient writings suggest he went to Greece, and was eventually crucified on a saltire (X shaped) cross, from where he preached to the people for two days before dying. A medieval legend tells of his remains being taken to the coast of Scotland to a place now named St Andrews, which eventually led to him becoming the patron saint of Scotland.

Archdiocese News

Pope calls for 'lives steeped in compassion and charity' on World Day of the Poor.

'Christian hope, fulfilled in Jesus and realised in his kingdom, needs us and our commitment, needs our faith expressed in works of charity, needs Christians who do not look the other way,' the Pope said on 17 November, celebrating Mass for the World Day of the Poor in St Peter's Basilica. Making an appeal to the entire Catholic Church, all world governments and international organisations, the Pope said, 'Please, let us not forget the poor.' 'While one part of the world is condemned to live in the slums of history, while inequalities grow and the economy punishes the weakest, while society devotes itself to the idolatry of money and consumption, it so happens that the poor and marginalised have no choice but to continue to wait,' he said. Yet it is precisely amid darkness and despair 'that Jesus kindles hope', opening the horizon so that 'we may learn to grasp the presence of God's love, which comes close to us, does not abandon us, and acts for our salvation,' he said. The Catholic Church is not separate from the poor 'as if the Church existed as an independent reality that must then care for the poor,' Pope Francis said. 'The reality is that we become the Church of Jesus to the extent that we serve the poor.'

Red November: a chance to stand in solidarity with persecuted Christians.

Throughout November, Catholics in Melbourne and around the world are being called to remember and stand in solidarity with persecuted Christians through the Red November campaign, led by Aid to the Church in Need (ACN), a pontifical charity working for the cause of persecuted Christians globally. The climax of the Red November campaign was Red Wednesday, which fell on 20 November in 2024 and was marked by the illumination of churches and public buildings in red as a symbol of solidarity. This year, 24 Catholic cathedrals across Australia will participate, including Melbourne's iconic St Patrick's Cathedral.

ACN's recently released Persecuted and Forgotten? report paints a stark picture of the global challenges faced by Christian communities. The report details the harsh realities for believers in countries such as Nigeria, Burkina Faso, Nicaragua and the Holy Lands, where violence, discrimination and systemic persecution are part of daily life for many Christians.

'The suffering Church is bigger than one act or collection- 'It's a journey we should all be on together.' The goal of Red November is simple but profound: to stand with the persecuted, not just for a day or a month but as part of an ongoing commitment to the global Church.

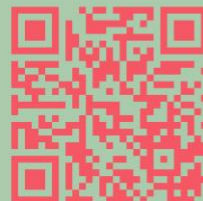
