REFLECTION: Origins of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day

Christ wanted it, that is, as the communion of saints.

All Saints' Day commemorates all the saints in heaven. The feast dates back to the early Church, when communities would gather and celebrate the anniversary of the martyr's death. During the persecution under the emperor Diocletian at the beginning of the fourth century the number of martyrs became so great that a separate day could not be assigned to each saint, so the Church established a common feast day for all the martyrs. The first mention of this feast came during the pontificate of Pope Gregory III (731-741). On 1 November, 732, Pope Gregory consecrated a chapel in the Basilica of St Peter dedicated to honour all the saints. The choice of day may have been also intended to co-opt the Ancient Roman 'Feast of the Lamures,' on which Romans used to placate the restless spirits of the dead. A century later, Pope Gregory IV (827-844) extended the celebration on 1 November to the universal Church.

All Saints Day represents the desire of the faithful to commemorate all saints, 'great multitude which no man could number' (Revelation 7:9), especially those who have no proper feast day of their own. It is a time to consider the example saints offer us and to reflect on how we can imitate their lives. As Pope Benedict XVI said, All Saints' Day calls us 'to see the Church... as

All Souls' Day follows All Saints Day on 2 November and is also known as the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed and the Day of the Dead. It is a day of prayer and remembrance for the souls of those who have died. Believers pray for the souls which, on departing from the body are not perfectly cleansed from venial sins- The idea is that the living faithful can help them with prayers, almsgiving and especially the Sacrifice of the Mass. All Souls Day originally was celebrated in the Easter season, around Pentecost Sunday. By the tenth century, the celebration had been moved from Pentecost to October. Sometime between 998 and 1030, St Odilo of Cluny ordered the commemoration of the faithful departed on 2 November. The day is dedicated to prayer and remembrance, with requiem Masses held. A plenary indulgence may be gained for the dead on All Souls' Day, by visiting a Church and praying the Lord's Prayer and the Creed. Many people also visit and sometimes decorate the

'Something new is growing': final synod document calls for greater participation and transparency

The Synod on Synodality concluded its 2024 assembly with a call for renewal across the global Catholic community. The final document, approved on 26 October, said parishes and dioceses must move quickly to give life to the consultative bodies and broad participation in mission and ministry if the Catholic Church is to have any hope of becoming a more 'synodal' Church. The synod document calls for several concrete steps to encourage broader participation in the Church's mission. Among these is: the call to empower parish and diocesan consultative bodies and expand lay involvement in ministry and governance roles, the role of women in the Church and called for expanded recognition of women's contributions in ministry and leadership, and confronted the need to overcome clericalism and the abuses of power. Lay men and women have many talents that can and should assist bishops and parish priests in the smooth functioning of their dioceses or parishes, synod members said.

The Living Word

Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

3 November 2024

First Reading Dt 6:2-6

Hear Israel, you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart.

Moses said to the people: 'If you fear the Lord your God all the days of your life and if you keep all his laws and commandments which I lay on you, you will have a long life, you and your son and your grandson. Listen then, Israel, keep and observe what will make you prosper and give you great increase, as the Lord God of your fathers has promised you, giving you a land where milk and honey flow.

'Listen, Israel: The Lord our God is the one Lord. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength. Let these words I urge on you today be written on your heart.'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 17:2-4, 47, 51, R.v.2

Second Reading Heb 7:23-28

This one, because he remains for ever, has an eternal priesthood.

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows, then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him.

To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.

Gospel Acclamation Jn 14:23

Alleluia, alleluia!

All who love me will keep my words, and my Father will love them and we will come to them.

Gospel Mk 12:28-34

This is the first commandment, and the second is similar to it.

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord you God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, Master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love him with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength, and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken, said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.



Reflection by Rev. B Reed

No-one who hears this Gospel today would disagree with its content. The centre of religious faith is love.

Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and soul and mind and love your neighbour as yourself. It's what people understand our faith to be about. The thing that scandalises people more than anything else is when they look on and see that people of faith do not love: that instead they hate, they operate out of power, envy, exploitation and self-profit.


Love is always challenging us to check ourselves and our relationships. Love is always calling us to reflect more deeply on our motivations, our conversation, our deliberations. Love sits before us not as a judge but as a beacon, a light, a fire burning before us. God is love. And God is always before us beckoning us further into the light and warmth that is God. God's love never goes out. God's offer of love is perpetual. It is always to be trusted, to be relied upon, and it is such that we can always be sure of it.

We are always being called more deeply and anew into the life of love and thus of God. Sometimes this love is calling us to a particular person; I can see that the other, my friend, my colleague, needs love. Sometimes love is calling us onto the streets to speak out boldly. Sometimes love calls us to be helpless love, a quiet presence, a reflective longing, or just to keep a dream alive.

Love always asks us to give something of ourselves. Sometimes that love is a leap of faith. Sometimes it is an act of the greater good for all. Pope Francis says, "each one of us can make his or her own small gesture of love. No matter how small, love is always grand."

For Christians the best way to love is get to know God. And the best way to God is to get to know love as it was made visible in Jesus Christ who loved humanity to the end.

So let's pray that we might know that love of Christ even more deeply today.



t Charles Borromeo was born of a wealthy Italian family and was the nephew of Pope Pius IV. At the age of twenty two, he was summoned to Rome and made cardinal and administrator of the Papal states and the archdiocese of Milan. Despite his personal wealth, St Charles lived a simple, ascetic life and was a strong supporter of church reform. In 1564 he was ordained a priest and consecrated as bishop. He founded seminaries and instituted the teaching of doctrine to children in Sunday schools. Never one to ask of another something he was not prepared to do himself, St Charles worked tirelessly to help those in need.
