Advent Wreath Prayer: The Prophecy Candle of hope

Priest: The first week of Advent we remember the gift of hope we have in Christ. The prophets of Israel all spoke of the coming of Christ, of how a saviour would be born, a king in the line of David. They spoke of how he would rule the world wisely and bless all nations. [Candle is lit]

Let us pray together– Loving God, we thank you for the hope you give us. Help us prepare our hearts for the Lord's coming by being open to seeing the light of Christ in others. We ask this in the name of the one born in Bethlehem, Jesus our Lord. Amen

Communion Antiphon: Psalm 84:13

The Lord will bestow his bounty, and our earth shall yield its increase.

♦ FAITH REFLECTION: JESUS COMING AS THE LIGHT IN DARKNESS

Today is the First Sunday of Advent and in this season, we recall the *first coming* of God into our midst. We remember that moment in which Jesus humbled himself and became man, becoming one with us because of his desire to save us. We must keep in mind Christ comes not only for the Christmas season, but that his *second coming* will be at the end of time. We should always have this constant awareness. We anticipate it, but the knowledge of this future event is beyond our capabilities. No technology although advanced, can determine it. Consequently, Christ suggests to us some proper attitudes.

Firstly, Christ proposes us to "stay awake". It is amazing to note that the world today can be characterised as being awake and prepared. But spiritually speaking, what does it mean to stay awake? Staying awake means to keep in our minds the conscious decision to enter into the spirit of Advent. The word 'advent' means coming and Advent is a period of waiting for someone special to come. The traditional Advent wreath is placed in the church and candles will be lit each week. The four Advent candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. By lighting a candle each Sunday we prepare our hearts to welcome him:

- The Prophecy Candle, lit on the first Sunday of Advent, reminds us of the faith-filled hope of the prophets who foretold the coming of the Messiah.
- The Bethlehem Candle, symbolising faith and preparation, is lit in the second week.
- Joy is at the heart of the third week, as the Rose Candle is lit; and
- In the fourth week, the Angles Candle signifies peace on earth.
- The central white Christ Candle is lit on Christmas Eve, indicating the light of Christ that has come into the world.

Secondly, Christ suggests we should "be prepared" for his coming. Preparation for any eventuality is no stranger to us. For example, we spend a lot of money, time and energy on preparations, such as preparing for a party, preparing for an interview or a career move, preparing for a wedding or for the birth of a baby. In the same way, we need to prepare for the coming of the Lord. During Advent, our physical preparation, which is very evident, should be accompanied by a spiritual preparation. Conversion is also associated with the Advent season. The conversion should include the conversion of our hearts. There has to be a movement from selfishness to selflessness; from being not very generous to being generous. It's the Christmas season once again. Whether our 2024 journey has been good or bad, happy or sad- we still made it here. We all have our share of trials and pains, but we are still here, still alive, still awake, and still kicking! May the urgent call of the Advent season for vigilance and preparedness, convince each one of us not to postpone our conversion, and not to postpone our hearts. 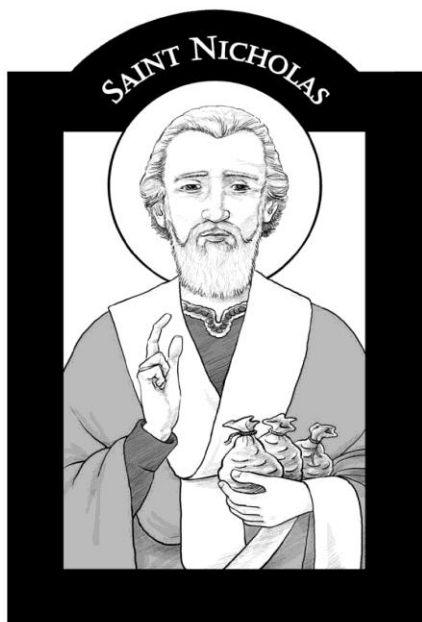

Reflection by Greg Sunter

We are, perhaps, used to thinking of the season of Advent as a time of preparation for the celebration of Christmas. But this week’s readings, and the readings of the next few weeks, remind us that the notion of preparation extends well beyond the celebration of the birth of Jesus. We are reminded that we are, in fact, living in an ‘in-between time’. From this week’s first reading we are reminded that the expectation of a Messiah was a very long-standing hope for Israel. The coming of the Messiah would usher in a new prosperity and a divine reign of God. The earliest Christians began to see that the ancient prophecies could all be applied to Jesus and they began to regard Jesus as the promised Messiah – the fulfilment of prophecy. However, Jesus also promised that he would come again, and the expectation of the first followers of Jesus was that his return would be in their lifetime. In our second reading from the letter to the Thessalonians, we can see the growing realisation that perhaps Jesus’ return will not occur within the current generation. This realisation had a dramatic effect on the life and faith of the community. Imagine living with the belief that the end of time was going to occur not just in your lifetime but literally any day now. Slowly, they realised that Jesus’ words were not that specific and the time of return had not been identified. What Jesus had called for was a state of readiness, a state of preparedness. This didn’t mean he was coming immediately; what it meant was that there was need to get the house in order because he would be coming at some time. Advent is a time to remember that we still haven’t really got the house in order.

St Nicholas was a 4th century bishop of Myra in Turkey and little is known about his life other than myths and legends. One such story tells of St Nicholas giving three young women a bag of gold each for their marriage dowries, in order to save them from prostitution. And in another, he is said to have brought back to life three boys who had been murdered. In the low countries of Europe, his popularity as a patron of children led to the custom of giving children presents on his feast day. Then later, Dutch Protestants living in North America combined this custom with the Nordic legend of a magician who rewarded good children with presents and punished those who were naughty. This new super-legend gave rise to the much beloved Santa Claus.

Archdiocese News

'Be hope and light': Archdiocese celebrates the coming Jubilee Year and countdown to ACYF 2025.

On Sunday 24 November 2024, on the solemnity of Christ the King of the Universe, young people and families from across the Archdiocese of Melbourne came together in joyous celebration at St Patrick's Cathedral. Representatives of parishes, faith movements and migrant communities gathered to mark three significant milestones: giving thanks for the Year of Prayer that is almost over; looking with anticipation to the launch of the 2025 Jubilee Year on 29 December; and marking one year until the Australian Catholic Youth Festival (ACYF) brings thousands of young people to Melbourne from across Australia.

In his opening remarks at Mass, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli reflected on Pope Francis' papal bull inaugurating the Jubilee Year. 'Hope does not disappoint ... Hope does not disappoint for hope is grounded in the promise of God who created this world of ours and us in it to have life in him,' he said. 'It was on a cross that God made this hope a reality, where Jesus Christ won for us our salvation. His life in us does not disappoint. He has given us the reasons we need to build lives in hope.'

During the entrance procession, a number of symbols were carried forward that hold significance for the Jubilee Year: a yobel, a ram's horn traditionally blown on the Day of Atonement, from which the word jubilee comes; a Jubilee candle, signifying the light of Christ passed onto others in hope; a stole used by priests in the sacrament of Reconciliation, signifying Christ's mercy; the book of the gospels; and a statue of the Homeless Jesus, a reminder that corporal works of mercy are a prominent theme throughout jubilee years. A number of representatives from parish communities were blessed by Archbishop Comensoli and given a Jubilee candle to return with to their parish and to burn throughout 2025. Following Mass, the grounds of the Cathedral were buzzing as people young and old gathered for food and to enjoy music performed by Awaken Ministry.

There was also an opportunity to hear from three young people who attended ACYF in Perth in 2019. They spoke of their experience in 2019, describing how their time at ACYF changed their lives. Archbishop Comensoli encouraged everyone present to be hope and light to those around them.

'So I want to say to you: be hope amongst your friends, family and those you go to school with ... And be lights for them to see. Ask Jesus that you be that light. Allow yourself to glow for others.'
